Exceeding – Family and Community Links. Unique Environment and Supervision: Our supervision strategies and reasonable precautions are tailored to our service's unique environment. We address hard-tosee areas with mirrors or additional staff and adjust CCTV camera locations as needed. Being next to busy roads, we take extra care during drop-offs and pick-ups. We also prepare for environmental risks like snakes or extreme weather by regularly updating our emergency procedures and considering the specific needs of our site.

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To begin, we carefully assess our environment, taking into account the layout, design, and features of our physical space. Especially in springtime when the trees regrow their leaves and it can be harder to see children climbing in them. We identify any potential hazards, such branches that have been broken from the trees, wood that has splintered on the climbing equipment. We ensure the children help us identify any areas they fell is unsafe or they need adult help with when playing or learning.


We also recognise the importance of adapting our supervision arrangements to any changes that may occur. Whether it's renovations, additions, or changes in rooms, we conduct regular assessments to determine the impact on our supervision needs. During renovations in one part of the building we took additional precautions to ensure the safety of the children while allowing them to be engaged with the builders and discover what they were doing. We created temporary barriers and adjusting activity areas to keep children away from potential hazards, which we identified as a group.

Within the environment, we are attentive to the behaviour of the children. We understand that each child is unique and may exhibit different behaviours. I take the time to observe and understand their individual needs, ensuring that supervision is tailored to meet those needs. Some children may require closer supervision due to impulsive behaviour, while others may need personalised attention and support. By recognising these behaviours, we provide appropriate levels of supervision to keep them safe.


Implementing 'reasonable precautions' is a fundamental aspect of our supervision arrangements. We take practical steps to prevent or minimise risks within our environment. This includes securing heavy furniture to prevent tipping, using childproof locks on cabinets with hazardous materials, and establishing clear guidelines and expectations for behaviour. I regularly review and update these precautions to ensure they remain relevant and effective.
